ONGOING PROJECTS

Developing a Patient-Centered Framework for Measuring, Monitoring and Optimizing Rheumatoid Arthritis Care



As part of the Balanced Scorecard (BSC) project, Dr. Claire Barber at the University of Calgary and Dr. Diane Lacaille at the University of British Columbia, have been leading a National CIHR-funded study to define quality RA care and build a framework for measuring it. The research team is currently hard at work on analyzing the results of the public survey conducted in June and how it may impact the development of the scorecard. Preliminary findings of the Balanced Scorecard project for RA patients will be presented at the AAC Annual Meeting on November 29, 2019 in Toronto. *Stay tuned for more updates on this important project!*



The CRA-AAC-CIHR-CATCH Collaborative Project to Build an Economic Business Case for AAC IA Models of Care

The 4-way collaboration project, a study on building an economic business case for the AAC Inflammatory Arthritis Models of Care (IA MOCs), is well progressing. By present moment, the research team had completed the first phase of the study - qualitative research, which included surveys and interviews with key representatives from 10 sites from the Canadian Early Arthritis Cohort (CATCH), representing four provinces, Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec. Researchers are now working on the first draft of a report with the findings from this qualitative work. Some results of this work will be presented at the AAC Annual Meeting on November 29, 2019 in Toronto. *The working team is excited about this project's interim success and will continue updating you on its progress!*

Arthritis Patient-led Groups Develop "Talk to Your Doctor about Joint Pain" Handout

Arthritis patient-led organizations are preparing for the release of its <u>Talk to Your Doctor About Joint Pain Handout</u> in September during Arthrits Awareness month. The Handout is a patient version of the <u>Osteoarthritis Tool for Family Physicians</u> that was launched by the AAC and the College of Family Physicians of Canada in 2017 to provide primary care providers who are managing patients with new or recurrent joint pain from osteoarthritis in the hip, knee or hand, with a standardized guideline to assist with assessing and triaging patients with OA symptoms.

Talk to Your Doctor About Joint Pain Handout has been developed through a collaborative process involving representatives from patient-led and patient-focused organizations, in close consultation with members of the AAC Models of Care Committee and scientific and clinical experts in OA, with the goal of enhancing education and raising awareness in osteoarthritis care and prevention. This tool is also designed to assist those with or at risk of OA, in having better conversations with their doctors or other health care professionals, by informing them about the care they can expect to receive. Stay tuned for the upcoming launch of the Handout on September 12th!

AAC 2019 Research Awards Program: Update

The review of the **forty-three** (43) applications for the AAC Research Awards 2019 is in full swing. **Twenty-one** (21) reviewers from the arthritis community-14 researchers and 7 patient representatives-with expertise in arthritis research are currently evaluating these applications. The review process is expected to complete on August 31st, at which point the selection process will start. Six research awards, including 1) Master Student, 2) PhD Student, 3) Post-doctoral Fellow, 4) Early Career Researcher in Basic/Clinical Science, 5) Early Career Researcher in Health Science/Population Health and 6) Patient for Active Engagement in Arthritis Research, will be presented to the winning applicants during the *Special Awards Ceremony on Friday, November 29th in Toronto. Thank you all for your great support in making this AAC program a successful effort once again!*

Exciting Activities at ARC over the Summer



Arthritis Research Canada had an exciting summer, with scientists securing close to \$3 million in research grants from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, the Canadian Rheumatology Association and the BC Support Unit. As you know, less than 10 per cent of all submitted grants to the CIHR receive funding, so this is a big accomplishment for arthritis research.

Studies include: a physiotherapist-led primary care model for low back pain, systemic sclerosis, fathers' engagement during pregnancy (when arthritis is involved), tumor necrosis factor inhibitors and the potential connection to multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis and the decision to continue treatment during pregnancy. Researchers will also study the effectiveness of the BC government fee code to support rheumatology nurses in treating inflammatory arthritis, the role of tools in rheumatoid arthritis patient outcomes, new statistical methods to permit better estimates of treatment interventions, and new techniques of measuring the antinuclear antibody test for lupus.

Arthritis Research Canada summer students secured almost \$20,000 in funding to examine Reddit forums, the experiences and information needs of individuals with arthritis and comorbid mental disorders, mental health complications in pregnant and postpartum women with rheumatoid arthritis, and Canadian Rheumatology Association rheumatoid arthritis guidelines. Researchers will also work to develop a reminder system to help physicians prevent inflammatory arthritis complications.



Health Canada Raises Concerns about Unproven Cell Therapies

RI-MUHC would like to share the information regarding the safety and effectiveness of cell therapies. Recently, Health Canada has raised concerns relating to Canadian health care practitioners who transmit unproven information regarding the safety and effectiveness of cell therapies (e.g., stem cell therapy). Some of these physicians have even started offering unauthorized cell therapies to patients, potentially exposing them to life-threatening or life-altering risks (e.g., serious infections). Since all cell therapies fall under the category of drugs according to the Food Page | 6

and Drugs Act, these treatments must be authorized and regimented by Health Canada. To date, only three therapies (Prochymal, Kymriah and Yescarta) have been granted market authorization by Health Canada. Apart from these therapies, some treatments can be administered to patients under the conditions of a Health Canada-approved clinical trial, which can be found on Canada's Clinical Trials Database. At the moment, most known cell therapies are in their experimental phases.

CANADIAN RHEUMATOLOGY ADMINISTRATIVE DATA NETWORK

McGill University Health Centre



Interesting research projects are underway at the Research Institute of the McGill University Health Centre (RI MUHC), led by rheumatologist Dr. Évelyne Vinet. To improve strategies for health professionals counselling pregnant women with rheumatic disease, her team conducted a focus group

study assessing the clinical and psychosocial needs, barriers, and facilitators to pregnancy counselling in women with RA and SLE. Abstracts for this study were presented at the 2018 ACR and at the 2019 CRA. She is also building the Lupus prEGnAnCY (LEGACY) cohort, a large, multi-centre, international prospective cohort of SLE pregnancies, to evaluate adverse pregnancy outcomes, their predictors, and potential preventive therapies. A Canadian Initiative for Outcomes Research in Arthritis (CIORA) funded randomized controlled trial is underway assessing an educational tool for improving preeclampsia knowledge in pregnant women with SLE. Dr. Vinet was the recipient of the Laurentian Rheumatology Conference 50th Anniversary Award (\$1,000) where she also presented Lupus: a case of female discrimination. The CANRAD Network team includes a variety of decision makers, epidemiologists, clinicians and researchers interested in the use of administrative data for rheumatic disease research. We are currently organizing a CANRAD webinar for the fall. The CAnadian Network for Advanced Interdisciplinary Methods for comparative effectiveness research (CAN-AIM) objective is to respond to key knowledge gaps regarding drug safety and effectiveness by answering queries which arise from Health Canada and other regulatory parties. We are currently working with several enhanced cohorts, including PiMS, CATCH, CanHepC and GENESIS-PRAXY, as well as

responding to a number of queries from Health Canada using other clinical and administrative databases. Our team has collaborated with DSECT's webinar series; we encourage you to participate in the very informative sessions. We were recently funded to build a biologic registry to provide real-world information comparing the safety and effectiveness of biosimilar drugs versus their originator biologic drugs. Our five-year study includes adults (aged 18 years and older) with inflammatory rheumatic disease or inflammatory bowel disease who are initiating therapy with a biosimilar or the originator biologic drug. The primary outcome is simply maintenance of treatment, but we will also collect information on start/stop/changes in systemic steroids and immunosuppressive drugs, disease control, and adverse effects, particularly infection.
